I would also like to say thanks, once more, to those of you who so generously gave to others as part of the Giving Green campaign. I know it is so hard to give right now after so few raises in the last few years. But you *did*, and many people in our Charlotte community will benefit from your generosity. And even more, the College has set a new record for giving! We had 44 percent donate this year, which is double our results from last year. Thank you to Susan and Misty for your leadership.
