TEACHER QUALITY PARTNERSHIP GRANT

UNC Charlotte, in partnership with Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools was awarded a \$2.2 million Teacher Quality Partnership Grant. Led by Dr. Scott Kissau (PI) and Drs. Teresa Petty, Lan Kolano, Joan Lachance, and Michelle Stephan (Co-PIs), Project TLC: Preparing Teachers of Language and Content seeks to prepare teachers of hard-to-staff content areas, who are also equipped to meet the needs of English learners (ELs). Project TLC involves three diverse cohorts of 12 teacher candidates (36 total) who complete customized curriculum and professional development leading to dual licensure in a hard-tostaff subject (e.g., high school math) and K-12 English as a second language. Candidates will receive a living wage stipend (\$39,000), be hired at one of 12 identified CMS high-need schools, and receive two years of induction support.

MULTIPLE GRANT RECIPIENT!

Dr. Sejal Foxx and UNC Charlotte colleagues (Dr. Brett Tempest, Dr. Catherine Blat, and Dr. Stephanie Galloway) were awarded an NSF Scholarships in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics grant. Toward the goal of enabling low income students to obtain engineering

degrees, the project will support 25 scholars with scholarships of \$5,000- \$10,000 per year. Additionally, a suite of evidence-based programming will be deployed to enhance opportunities for socialemotional learning, academic skills development, and social and navigational capital building that were missed due to the pandemic. This programming will be made accessible to scholars and other lowincome students, including many from first-generation and underrepresented groups within the college of Engineering.

Dr. Foxx was also awarded an Equitable Foundation grant for \$46,966 over three years to support program evaluation services aimed at supporting college access programs in the Charlotte area. The aims will be to determine metrics that create college access, support student development for college and careers, and identify best practices.

PRESTIGIOUS ENGLISH LANGUAGE SPECIALIST PROJECT

The U.S. Department of State announced the selection of Dr. Spencer Salas of the University of North Carolina at Charlotte for a two-week English Language Specialist project focusing on teacher capacity building with the Kuwaiti Ministry of Education. Dr. Salas is part of

a select group, as his project is one of approximately 240 that the English Language Specialist Program supports each year. The two-week program is an extension of Dr. Salas's longstanding international scholarship of engagement in the field of Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages.

MINING FOR GOLD

Mining for Gold is an initiative that has traditionally been offered by CLAS, but is now open to graduate students across campus. The program is designed to encourage more graduate students to apply for externally funded fellowships and to improve their chances of success. It is comprised of several workshops, some focused on graduate opportunities generally, and others on specific fellowship opportunities (e.g. NIH F31, NSF GRFP, etc.). Interested doctoral students are encouraged to be on the lookout for an upcoming announcement of dates.


FINANCIAL LITERACY WORKSHOPS














EDLD Enrollment Fall 2021 and Fall 2022





GRADUATE PROGRAM ENROLLMENT




REEL Enrollment Fall 2021 and Fall 2022

FACULTY RESEARCH GRANTS PROGRAM

UNC Charlotte sponsors an internal Faculty Research Grants (FRG) program designed to assist faculty in conducting well-defined, purposeful, new research or creative or scholarly activities. The program is divided into two categories: continuing faculty, and newly appointed assistant professors. The 18-month program allows each individual project to have a maximum budget of \$8,000, including a stipend of up to \$4,200. Faculty submitting joint proposals may request up to \$16,000 (\$8,000 per faculty member; maximum stipend of \$8,400). Proposals must be uploaded electronically as a single PDF file to Niner Research. Proposals for the 2023-2024 program are due by 5:00 pm on Friday, October 28, 2022. Interested faculty are encouraged to submit a support ticket well in advance of the deadline (at least 10 days) to adhere to the 10:5:2 policy. FALL 2022 PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SERIES

To support our current teacher candidates in their effort to pass the PRAXIS II, as well as other licensure tests (e.g., Foundations of Reading), and to remove barriers for those hoping to use a passing PRAXIS II score to meet admission requirements, the Cato College of Education plans to offer free PRAXIS and Foundations of Reading preparatory workshops for all current and aspiring students.

In addition, we plan to offer two more professional development workshops requested by our school and community partners to meet current needs. This fall, we will offer one workshop on literacy tutoring strategies for families and teachers and another on trauma-invested practices. Ignite Planning Grants promote new collaborative research efforts and facilitate the development of interdisciplinary teams focused on preparing competitive, large-scale collaborative proposals for significant external funding. Ignite planning grants are intended to enhance existing areas of excellence, accelerate the development of emerging research strengths, and foster interactions between UNC Charlotte faculty and potential collaborators at other institutions. The program aims to lower and eliminate barriers to building collaborative teams and coordinating, planning, and preparing large, interdisciplinary multi-investigator research proposals by providing funds to (1) convene conferences and meetings, (2) coordinate workshops, (3) support travel costs for potential collaborators from other institutions, (4) hire grant-writing consultants and content specialists, and (5) conduct other proposal-development and team-development activities. WRITING OFFICE HOURS

Please encourage graduate students to attend Writing Office Hours each Wednesday with Associate Teaching Professor of Writing, Dr. Lisa Russell-Pinson. Sessions focus on participants' questions about academic writing, writing tips, how to write good literature reviews, how to write more efficiently, how to get good feedback from advisors, and upcoming writing events. WEEKEND WRITE

FRIDAY MORNING WRITING

Each Monday from 10am-12:30pm, Dr. Lisa Russell-Pinson facilitates a dissertation writing group in Atkins 146. The Dissertation Writing Group is a supportive writing group that helps dissertation writers to form or refine writing and work habits, break isolation, and take advantage of structured writing time. To be eligible students must be actively working on their dissertation and able to commit to attending each in-person session for four weeks.
