Hosting Students from Australia

For three weeks in January and February a group of undergraduate students studying Education or related majors at Australian universities came to UNCC for a short-term program called *Teacher Education & Practice*. The UNCC Office of Intercultural Outreach Programs partnered with the College of Education

to give the group a comprehensive experience, showcasing teaching and in urban K-12 classrooms. group, totaling nearly 25 Australians had the opportunity to complete site a variety of schools in the surrounding area, including schools, The Charlotte Engineering Early College program here on campus, a school, and a private school. the initial visits with

overviews of classroom experiences from an urban setting perspective, the group also participated in several days of intensive clinical visits whereby they stayed in one CMS placement with one cooperating teacher to design and deliver a few lessons of their own. In addition to the clinical experiences, the visiting Education candidates spent time with UNCC faculty for clinical debriefs and reflective seminars. Likewise, they were offered information sessions that mirrored aspects of an introductory course on Foundations of Education, giving the group context for their clinical experiences. They also spent many evenings attending local cultural events such as a Checkers Hockey Match, Lowes Motor Speedway, seeing the Broadway performance of Wicked at the Blumenthal Performing Arts Center, and experiencing a "snow day" (a highlight for some who had never seen snow before). The group was highly engaged with the students in the clinical placements and returned to Australia very impressed with the student-centered pedagogy they experienced while visiting. Many thanks to the UNCC Office of Intercultural Outreach Programs for collaborating with us in the College of Education. It was an outstanding, impactful experience for all.

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Niner Clinical Immersion Schools

Now entering its second semester, UNC Charlotte's College of Education's N.C.I.S. program continues to grow! N.C.I.S. (Niner Clinical Immersion Schools) is a pilot program launched in the fall semester of 2015 designed to to support graduate certificate level candidates via their participation in structured and rigorous pre-service clinical observations. The program has evolved rapidly to now include five (5) disctricts (Cabarrus/Charlotte-Mecklenburg/Iredell-Statesville/Union/Burke) with opportunities for both middle and high school candidates alike. Additionally, work is in progress to add our first elementary education cohort beginning in the summer of 2016. Additional N.C.I.S. Liaisons have been added from the Office of Field Experiences team to help manage that process.
