Jeanneine Jones (MDSK) was recently named the recipient of the C. Kenneth McEwin Distinguished Service Award. This is the highest award the NC Middle Level Association gives each year. The award is presented to an individual or to a school or organization that has had a significant long-term impact on the advancement of middle-level education in North Carolina. Jeanneine has been an active advocate and champion of middle grades education across the state for 42 years, first as an 8th grade teacher and then as a middle level professor here at UNC Charlotte.

Jeanneine will also be recognized in April at the UNC Charlotte University Alumni Association Reception as the recipient of the Distinguished Faculty Award.

Education Career Fair: The annual Education Career Fair will take place on Friday, March 23rd from 10:00am-1:00pm in the Student Activity Center. Over 130 organizations are expected to attend and will recruit for teaching, school administration, school counseling, and school social work positions. Attendance is free for students and no registration is required.

Career Pathways in Education: 8:45 - 9:45 a.m. in the Salons in the Student Activity Center. This is an interactive discussion with current teachers from a variety of professional backgrounds as well as administrators, instructional coaches, and others.

UNCC/CMS Curriculum Showcase for Aspiring Teachers: 1:00 - 3:00 p.m. in the Salons in the Student Activity Center. Attendees will hear the guest speaker, CMS Superintendent Wilcox, and curriculum directors from CMS who will share materials and resources used to support new teachers.

Field-Based, Integrated Learning Experiences

In an effort to provide UNC Charlotte preservice teachers with experiences working with K-5 students, Brian Kissel and Amy Good have designed a series of joint field trip experiences. These field trips,

which integrate Social Studies and Language Arts, take place within the community and help UNC Charlotte students and young students understand connections between the two subject areas. Young students get opportunities to leave their classrooms



and learn about the world around them, while UNC Charlotte students get important experiences seeing, first hand, how young children develop as writers.

These field trips are a result of a Chancellor's Diversity Grant developed by Erik Byker, Erin Miller, Brian Kissel, and Amy Good. Two professors (Byker and Good), using their Social Studies knowledge, developed integrated curricula with two other professors (Kissel and Miller) using their knowledge of writing instruction and writing processes, to create several day-long classroom experiences that show the connections between the two subject

areas. These day-long experiences are made possible because all four professors teach 3-hour long sections of their courses, back-to-back, allowing for combined 6-hour learning experiences. The joint experiences include:

- A UNCC Historical Tour and Narrative Writing Experience
- A field trip to the Levine Museum and Informational Text Writing Experience
- A field trip to an Elementary School and a Persuasive Writing Experience
- A day-long Writer's Workshop with a well-known author (in the past we've had Carole Boston Weatherford and Zetta Elliott) and Poetry Writing Experiences



Developing and Growing Teachers to Get Better Faster



The NC New Teacher Support Program's Instructional Support Coaches completed a book study of *Get Better Faster* last fall and in February had the incredible opportunity to participate in two-day training with author Paul Babmrick-Santoyo. The book study and training have been life-changing for the coaches in our region, and the implementation of the scope and sequence has had a profound impact on their coaching lens. Through their experiences, they have a better understanding of the power of practice, planning, and in-themoment feedback on the teaching and learning cycle in the classroom. The dream of helping teachers develop faster is becoming a reality!

STEM Super Competition

Paula Testerman (STEM) shared: We had a successful Super Competition event, led by **Ian Binns (REEL)** and myself, on Monday, March 5. We organize and run Level 3 and Comprehensive Math qualifying contests at UNC Charlotte, along with several other qualifying sites statewide. (Some other sites hold Levels 1-2, though we do not at the current time.) Chemistry and physics contests were also held, though those contests do not go on to any other higher-level competitions.

Winners from the UNC Charlotte High School Math Contests qualified to move up to the state High School Mathematics competitions in both Level 3 Math (the top 10) and Comprehensive Math (also the top 10). The N.C. High School Mathematics Finals will be on April 26, 2018 for Comprehensive Math. It is held annually at the North Carolina School for Science and Mathematics.

The Regional Finals (for Levels 1-3) are scheduled to be held on May 3, 2018, at 3 regional campuses. Our Level 3 winners who qualified here on March 5 may choose to move up to the Regional Finals, and they generally attend the Western Regional Finals at UNC-Asheville.

Heather Coffey (MDSK) shared: The University of North Carolina at Charlotte is pleased to host Writing Project Young Writers Camp, at the UNC Charlotte main campus from 9:00 to 3:00 pm daily. Students in rising grades 2-8 are invited. Camp will run concurrently with Summer Institute, July 9-13 and 16-20. Students are encouraged to attend one or both sessions for \$250/week (\$150 for faculty and staff).

This year's theme is Finding Inner Peace. Students attending this camp will have the opportunity to grow as mindful writers. The goal is to inspire aspiring authors to use writing and other forms of communication to become more present and thoughtful. Campers and teachers together will explore how we can use our voices to bring peace to the local community and beyond. Students will also have the opportunity to take carefully chaperoned field trips tentatively planned at ImaginOn, Romare Bearden Park, and the Center City campus.

Led by licensed teachers, campers will read age-appropriate mentor texts and receive instruction on key elements of writing, including voice, evidence, characterization, and style.

We will host an open mic for students to read excerpts from their work both Fridays at 3pm. Families are invited to celebrate this writing with us. Students will select their favorite pieces of writing to be published in an anthology. Each family will receive one copy in the fall, and additional copies will be available online for purchase.
